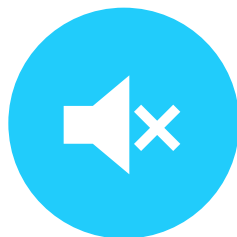

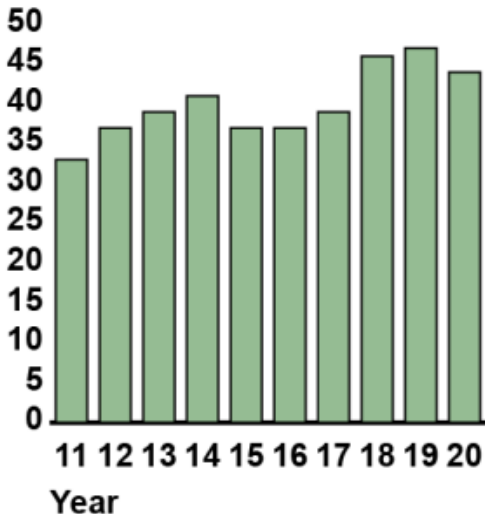

Number of States, including the District of Columbia, Where the Three Largest Issuers Had at Least 80 Percent of Enrollment, by Market, 2011-2020

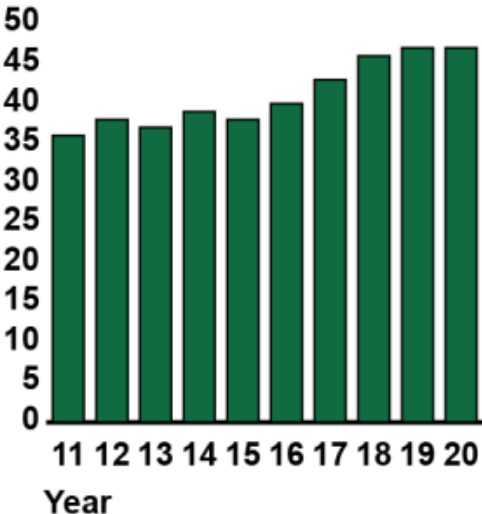

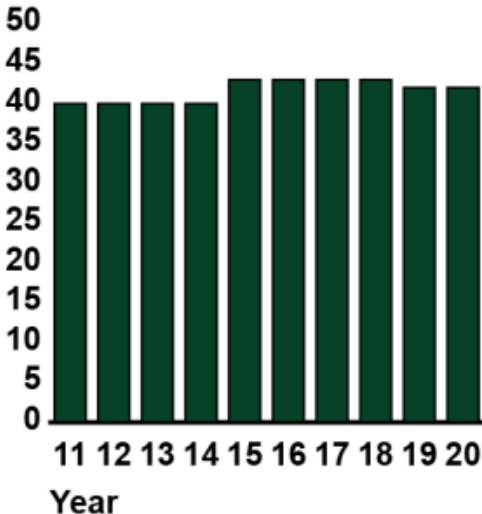

Wyden Reports Deceptive Marketing Practices in Medicare Advantage that Harm Seniors

Following Multi-State Survey, Finance Chairman Finds Substantial Increase in Marketing Materials and Tactics Designed to Trick Seniors

Electronic Prior Authorization

What happened before: Trump Admin Final Rule

January 2021 – rescinded

PURPOSE: Reduce amount of time providers must wait for a prior auth decision (72 hours for urgent requests or 7 days for non-urgent)

WHO: Medicaid, CHIP and QHP payers (not Medicare Advantage plans or employer-sponsored insurance plans)

WHAT: Part of CMS interoperability rule for payers. Beginning on January 1, 2023, payers must add APIs to support prior auth requirements

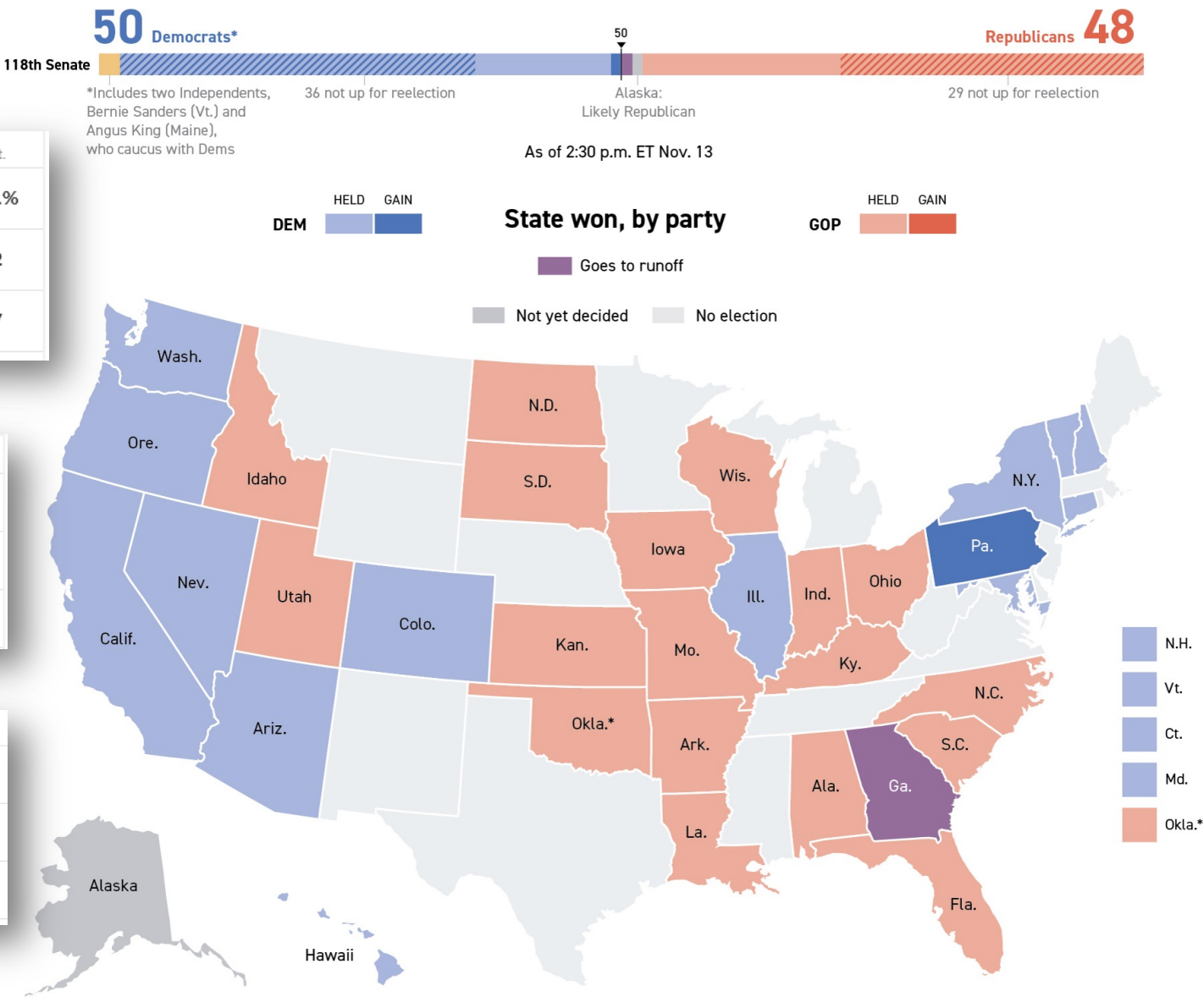

Republicans flip 15 seats to likely gain control of the House

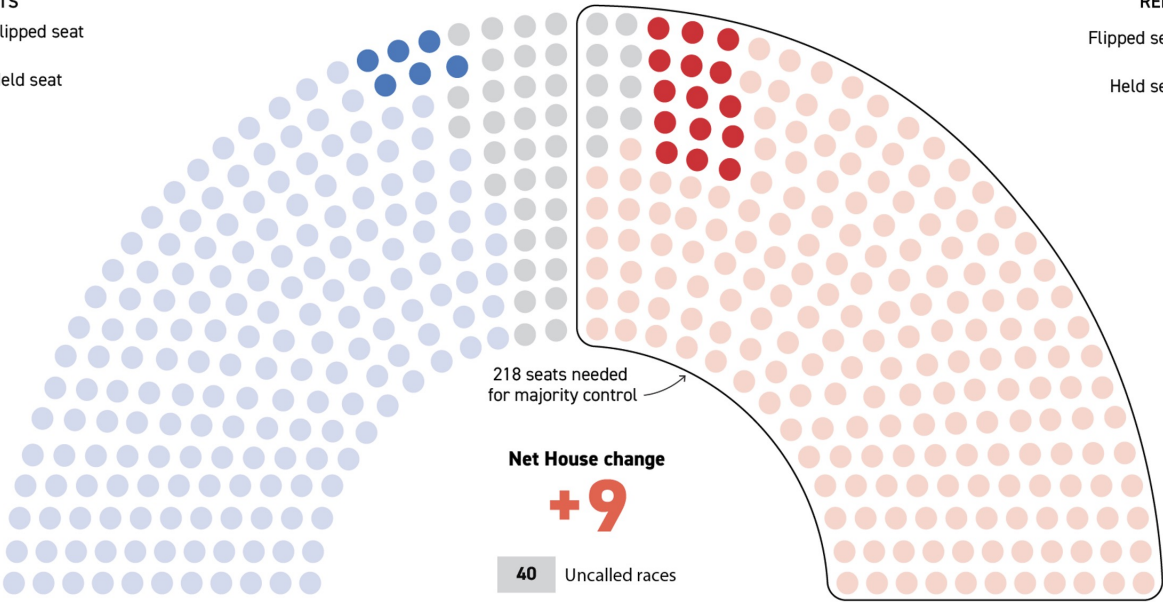
Republicans have made significant gains in House districts previously held by Democrats, with 15 flips across 10 states. In four of those districts, Republicans defeated Democratic incumbents, including DCCC chair Sean Patrick Maloney of New York. Republicans need 11 more seats to clinch the majority and are favored to win 13 of the 40 remaining races, according to POLITICO's analysis.

Saving Access to Laboratory Services Act (SALSA)

- Senators Burr (R-NC) and Brown (D-OH) introduced the Saving Access to Laboratory Services Act (SALSA) .
 - Updates Medicare’s payment system for clinical diagnostic laboratory services.
 - Introduced in House by Reps. Bill Pascrell (D-NJ), Scott Peters (D-CA), Richard Hudson (R-NC), Gus Bilirakis (R-FL), and Kurt Schrader (D-OR).
 - Permanent reform of PAMA based on MedPAC recommendations
 - CBO Score “at least \$6 billion”

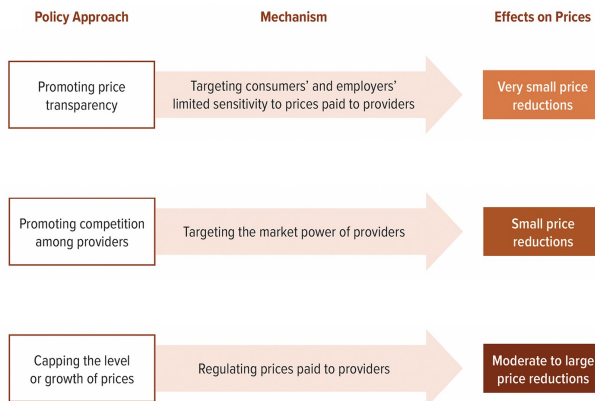
Additional Regulations and Policies

Information Blocking

- **Information Blocking** – “a practice that is likely to interfere with, prevent, or materially discourage access exchange or use of electronic health information”
- Laboratories considered providers under regulation
- Plans have separate requirements on APIs under CMS rules

Price Transparency

- Ongoing Implementation
- “Good Faith Estimate” RFI
- CBO opinion that transparency “very small” impact



FDA Regulation of LDTs

- VALID Act
- Califf says FDA may act on its own

Genetic Testing

- Rising cost to Medicare v. Medicare Solvency
- Patent Reform (Tillis – Cotton)
